

MA Political Science

- Empirical-analytical focus with high degree of substantive flexibility
- Analyzing major societal, political, and economic challenges (democracy and elections, political instability, populism, economic crises, European integration, globalization, inequality, and climate change)
- International environment (around 33% share of international students, faculty with international experience)
- Mandatory research methods training (research design, quantitative methods, qualitative methods)
- Thesis project

Prof Chitralekha Basu, PhD



- Academic background in history, political theory, and empirical political science
- Research interests:
- Relationship between political elites, parties and public opinion; implications for political equality and representation
 - E.g., projects on (i) inequalities of communicative power and representation; (ii) media effects on the economic vote
- Relationship between socioeconomic interests & political outcomes
 - E.g., projects on (i) relationship between inequality and democratization in Britain; (ii) the impact of the Great Migration on US political parties

Winter Term 2023-24:

- Democratic Theory and Practice (lecture)
 - What does "democracy" mean, and why should we value it?
 - What institutions and social conditions are conducive to democracy?
 - Topics covered: (1) theories of democracy; (2) effects of democracy; (3) challenges to democracy
- Democracy in the Twenty First Century (seminar)
 - Introduces students to cutting-edge research on recent transformations in democratic politics
 - Topics covered: impact of rising inequality, new technologies and COVID-19 on democratic politics; the 'crisis' of social democracy in Europe; the rise of populism; democratic erosion and backsliding in Europe and the US

Summer Term 2024:

- Strategic Models of Democratic Politics
 - Introduce students to use of rational choice theory to study politics
 - Learn to solve and interpret simple mathematical models
 - Engage with debates on the use of rational choice models in political science
- Elections as Instruments of Democracy
 - When are elections more or less effective as "instruments of democracy"?
 - Topics covered: theories of representation; inequalities in representation; campaign and media effects on voter preferences and behaviour



Program elements



Core Section (36 ECTS)

Select three out of five core lectures (18 ECTS)

- Comparative Political Institutions
- Comparative Political Economy
- Democratic Theory and Practice
- International Relations (seminars/some in German)
- European Politics

Take three methods courses (18 ECTS)

- Research Design (offered in winter and summer)
- Quantitative Methods (only winter)
- Qualitative Methods (only summer)



Specialization Section (30 ECTS)

- Select two advanced seminars (Special Topics, 12 ECTS)
 - One in Political Institutions and Representation
 - One in Comparative Political Economy and International Relations
- Select two research projects (Applied Theories and Methods, 12 ECTS)
 - One in Political Institutions and Representation
 - One in Comparative Political Economy and International Relations
- Take the research seminar to present your MA thesis draft (6 ECTS)



Supplementary section (24 ECTS)

- Interdisciplinary training component of all Master programs of the WiSo Faculty
- Either: Choose one group for 24 ECTS
 - Economics for Social Science II [numerous elective options]
 - Languages and Cultures of the Islamic World I [in German]
 - Studies Abroad II [for credit transfer]
- Or: Choose two groups for 12 ECTS
 - Economics for Social Science I [numerous elective options]
 - Economic Psychology
 - Economic Geography
 - Sociology
 - History [in German]
 - Languages and Cultures of the Islamic World II [in German]
 - Internship
 - Studies Abroad I [for credit transfer]



Thesis writing and advising (30 ECTS)

- Centralized procedure for allocation of advisors at beginning of your third term
- One of the professors acts as advisor and first examiner
- At least 60 ECTS required to start your thesis (after three semesters)
- Typically around 60 pages in length
- Topic and title are agreed between you and your advisor
- Present a draft in the research seminar
- Must be submitted within six months after registration
- Consult chair's guidelines, e.g. <u>Master thesis guidelines of Cologne Center</u> for Comparative Politics

Selecting courses and modules

- High flexibility, but you can complete each module only once
- Sequence
 - Recommended to take core courses before specialization courses but no fixed order
 - All three methods courses at introductory level
 - In advanced courses additional methods are applied
 - Consult the module catalogue for a recommended study plan and module cycles (winter vs summer term)
- Think carefully before choosing a module. Changing modules is only possible under certain conditions
